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About the Institute of Island Studies

Who we are

The Institute of Island Studies is a research and public policy institute based at the University of Prince Edward Island (UPEI) focusing on the culture, environment, and economy of small islands around the world, with an emphasis on Prince Edward Island. <u>Learn more</u>

Origins and historical contributions

The Institute of Island Studies (IIS) was founded in 1985 by former UPEI President Peter Meincke and first IIS Director Harry Baglole. Contributing to the formulation of public policy on PEI was always at the forefront of Harry Baglole's vision for the Institute. In time, the focus of the IIS has expanded to include seeing PEI through the lens of other islands, with a growing emphasis on evidence-based decision-making through research and knowledge mobilization.

Island Studies Press is the publishing arm of the Island Studies constellation at UPEI. Research

Recent and ongoing research projects by the IIS relating to environment and policy include:

- <u>Comparing Small Island States and Subnational Island Jurisdictions: Towards Sustainable</u>
 <u>Island Futures</u> (2017–2021)
 - Research project looking at people's attitudes toward governance and quality of life on small island states and subnational island jurisdictions, with a focus on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and sustainable island tourism.
- <u>COVID-19 Island Insights Series</u> (2020–2021)
 - Critical assessments of how specific islands around the world have performed during the COVID-19 pandemic and the extent to which their recovery plans are able to promote long term resilience and sustainability.
 - Upcoming workshop May 20, 2021, laying the groundwork for an event at COP26 in Glasgow in November 2021.

Additionally, the IIS has hosted many international scholars who come here to teach and study. For example, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the IIS hosted an intern from the Netherlands, supported by funding from <u>UPEI Climate Sense</u>, who was looking at the creative arts and climate change adaptation, feeding into policy.

Master of Arts in Island Studies

The Master of Arts in Island Studies (MAIS) at the University of Prince Edward Island is a unique, interdisciplinary, and policy-driven graduate program that critiques islands on their own terms. There are currently approximately 50 students in the program, and there have been approximately 50 graduates to date.

There are three specializations in the <u>course-based stream</u>, which was introduced in 2017:

- Island Tourism
- Sustainable Island Communities
- International Relations & Island Public Policy

In the long-running thesis program, there have been many theses relevant to environment and policy, including:

- From policy to action renewable energy in Samsø, Denmark (Transition to zero net carbon emissions; 2018)
- <u>Prince Edward Island and Renewable Energy: The Preconditions for a Sustainable Future</u> (Community reactions to wind turbines in Eastern PEI; in progress)
- Energy democracy on small islands (in progress)
- Summerside case study: Smart grids (in progress)

Contributing to Public Policy on Prince Edward Island

Through all of these activities, the Institute of Island Studies aims to be an "honest broker," bringing all sides to the table for informed discussion and debate. We endeavour to engage with various audiences, including government officials, politicians, academics, and the general public. We also offer contract research services to enable governments to create evidence-based policy.

Since its creation in 2016, the <u>UNESCO Chair in Island Studies and Sustainability</u> has opened many doors for the IIS and has contributed to UPEI's growing reputation as *the* international centre for island research and education.

Many of the Institute's research projects are supported by SSHRC and Tri-Council Research Grants, and we also continue to forge strong partnerships with the PEI Provincial Government and other agencies (e.g., Measuring Indicators of Quality of Life [forthcoming 4-year project]).

How do we measure success?

While it is sometimes difficult to know whether or to what degree the Institute's work has directly contributed to changing public policy on Prince Edward Island, there are several cases where the relationship is clear. For example, we know that in the 1990s the provincial government adopted our recommendation to use tax levers to lower taxes for businesses opening in Slemon Park, near Summerside. More recently, in 2018, the Institute was contracted by the Prince Edward Island Department of Workforce and Advanced Learning to undertake a research project to

determine the opportunities for and barriers to Islanders returning home, resulting in a <u>report</u> which directly informed a massive campaign called "<u>Maybe you should come home</u>."

As we look towards the future of Island Studies, there are many additional ways that the Institute of Island Studies can measure its success, such as continuity for over 35+ years, respect in the community, an international reputation, recognition for our publications, and being awarded the UNESCO Chair in Island Studies and Sustainability – just to name a few.
